# OUTCOMES OF THE 13 DECEMBER 2023 AUDIT AND RISK MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE MEETING AND ORDINARY MEETING OF COUNCIL

# Audit and Risk Management Meeting

Council held an Audit and Risk Management Committee Meeting where is considered several matters including the acceptance of the Annual Report 2022/2023 and Audit Findings. One of the principal objectives of the Committee is to accept responsibility for the annual external audit and to liaise with the Auditor so that Council can be satisfied with the performance of the local government in managing its financial affairs.

The Audit was completed within the legislative period for the first time in many years and the Auditor's recommendation to the Auditor General was that a qualified audit opinion (with moderate risk observed) be issued on the financial statements. The Auditor General accepted the Auditor's recommendations.

Committee also addressed the Annual Report which is the main item of business discussed at the Annual General Meeting of Electors. The Annual General Meeting of Electors is to be held on 7 February 2023. Please note that 2022/2023 Annual Report will be published shortly.

# Ordinary Meeting of Council

At the Ordinary Meeting, Elected Members considered several matters including:

 Council reviewed the allocation of projects for the Federal Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program Phase 4 (LRCIP 4) grant in order to meet their revised criteria. The Projects sought by Council are as follows:

By having *LRCIP 4* fund an existing budged program, Council was able to stand by an earlier commitment to contribute \$30,000 towards the Big Tractor project.

- Council agreed to support an application to Main Roads WA to add Winchester East Road to Regional Strategies for Significant Local Government Roads with Regional Importance ('ROADS 2040'). If successful, the funding contribution for the upgrade of Winchester East Road would be 2/3rd WA State Government and 1/3rd Shire.
- For Australia Day Events in 2024 and beyond, Council resolved to:
  - waive the facility hire fee for the Carnamah Town Hall annually by way of 'sponsorship' for each year;
  - authorise the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) in consultation with the Shire President to consider on a case by case basis, requests for donations for community/Shire organised events to undertake Australia Day events up to \$300.00 in Eneabba and Carnamah; and
  - request the CEO to donate free entry on 26 January each year to both the Eneabba and Carnamah swimming pools.
- Council adopted the Dates, Locations and Times of Ordinary Meetings for 2024 (these are published elsewhere in this week's Carnamah Mat and Eneabba News).
- A report was prepared addressing a request from the National Roads And Motorists' Association (NRMA) to support to establish a pair of ultrafast 180kw car chargers in Eneabba. The request had been advertised by the Shire and 10 submissions were received from local residents. Council considered the submissions and resolved to support NRMA's request in principle with the preferred locations for the car chargers either site 'A or new site 'C'. The matter will be referred back for Council in the future to consider an Access Licence Agreement that addresses (but not limited to) matters raised by the Shire's insurer (LGIS) as well as addressing s.3.58 Local Government Act 1995 relevant to the 'disposal' of land due to the issue of a Licence over land.
- A Confidential item was presented to Council addressing the Citizen of the Year Awards for 2024. Council assessed the nominations received against the criteria contained within the Assessment Matrix and authorised the Shire President and CEO to determine a winner of the awards based on Council's assessment.
- Cr Wooltorton moved a Notice of Motion (NoM) addressing Western Powers directions to land owners concerning private power poles. Council supported the NoM that the CEO provide a report to the earliest available to Council addressing the following:
  - Has the Shire received similar correspondence from WP (as per the attached) for land it owns?
  - o If so, how many Shire properties are potentially affected by the WP direction?
  - Does the Shire have any concerns in relation to the WP direction?
  - What are the perceived risk and management implications for the Shire (as a landowner) in relation to the WP direction?
  - What are the implications for the Shire where 'private' poles are located on road and other reserves (i.e., who is responsible)?
  - Could this be a matter that is referred by Council to the Northern Country Zone of WALGA?

# Shire President's Christmas message

As always, I am humbled by the passion and generosity of our community. We are a resilient and strong community, and I want to thank everyone for their contribution to the Shire of Carnamah.

For Council, it has been a particularly busy year. Whilst we lost our Carnamah Westpac Bank in February 2023, we were able to forge with other rural and regional communities across Australia to highlight the lack of care and understanding of banks when they close branches. This culminated in the Senate Committee holding a hearing in Carnamah chaired by Senator Canavan.

Council is excited about what lies ahead. The Shire and the North Midlands enormous potential is being realised by other levels of government and the private sector and Council will continue to everything it can to ensure that our community benefits from this potential.

After local government elections in October 2023, we said goodbye to Cr Wayne Counsel and Cr Ian Bowman who retired after many years of service to the community. It is appropriate to acknowledge Councillor Bowman's commitment to the community as he served as a councillor for over 14 years. Cr Risinger and I were returned with Emma Ogilvie and Barb Smallwood elected as Councillors. We all are working together with Shire Staff to embrace new opportunities and we continue collaborating with our community to make the Shire even better.

The Shire of Carnamah as do most rural and regional local governments rely heavily on our volunteers. On behalf of Council I want to acknowledge our dedicated volunteers who are the backbone of our community, and we are incredibly grateful for their commitment and personal contribution.

This Christmas, I encourage you to enjoy your time with family, friends and the wider community. Show kindness and where able, reach out and give to the less fortunate. On behalf of your Council and the Shire Staff at Shire of Carnamah, I wish everyone a safe and joyful festive season and many happy returns for the New Year.



# REPORTING A FIRE IN THE SHIRE OF CARNAMAH

To report any fire, call Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) on 000.

Once a fire is reported via 000, the Shire's CBFCO will be contacted by DFES. The CBFCO will then organise the response from the brigades and will contact DFES or the Shire if assistance is needed.

# HARVEST BANS AND OFF-ROAD ACTIVITY BANS (Harvest Ban)

Harvest and vehicle movement bans restricts the operation of machinery, vehicles and plant equipment likely to cause a fire when operated over or near flammable material, dry grass, stubble or bush. These bans are imposed when the expected weather predictions indicate that if a fire were to start, it would be dangerous, destructive and difficult to stop. Bans are only declared when the readings of the following conditions are above a certain level:

- wind:
- wind gusts;
- humidity;
- temperature; and
- fuel load/curing.

### TOTAL FIRE BANS

Total Fire Bans are called, reviewed, and subsequently removed by the DEFS Commissioner (not the Shire). On a Total Fire Ban day, it is illegal to light an openair fire or conduct any activity that could start a fire. # Christmas safety check – beware button batteries

It's that time of the year when many kids are counting down to Christmas! It's also the time our Consumer Protection safety inspectors are out and about making sure toys are safe for Santa's sack.

Button batteries, which power many kids' novelty toys, remain a deadly risk to small children if they swallow these tiny circular batteries. Our safety inspectors have already visited 58 stores and inspected almost 300 products, taking 53 non-compliant items off the shelf that were missing mandatory battery warning labels or failed to have secure battery compartments.

We advise parents and families to avoid buying children's toys containing button batteries, which are commonly used in toys that make fun sounds and light up. Some items already seized include Christmas-themed flashing headbands, fairy wands, key fobs, musical Christmas cards, and children's watches and torches.

Safety laws require button batteries to be securely contained and pass compliance testing. Despite these new laws, every week around 20 kids are taken to hospital emergency departments after swallowing a button battery that has become dislodged when the toy or item has been dropped or broken.

If you suspect your child has swallowed a button battery, take your child to your nearest emergency department or if your child is in breathing distress, call 000.

Other potentially risky Christmas gifts are eRideables, or motorised scooters, with increasing accidents being reported involving these devices. Many eRideables are designed for people over 16 years due to the speed limit exceeding 10km/h - the maximum allowable speed for children. Those under 16 are only allowed to use them on private property and in non-public areas. Helmets should always be worn and only one person should ride the device – no passengers are allowed.

And with the summer holidays come lazy days around the pool. Remember, even small portable pools can pose significant drowning risks to children if they hold more than 30 centimetres of water and lack pool fencing. When it comes to kids' water safety, constant adult supervision is the key.

\$117,000 Emergency Communications Upgrade for Mid West St John Ambulances

The roll out has been done in stages throughout 2023, with the final fit-outs to be complete by the end of January 2024.

# Providing a \$15,000 technology upgrade to Geraldton Universities Centre



We have funded IT upgrades at the **Geraldton Universities Centre**'s education and nursing classrooms, which will greatly enhance the quality of presentation both within the classroom and when students who live further afield need to webcam into tutorials.

These classrooms are used for up to 15 tutorials a week, with approximately 120 students attending.



Sponsoring Energy Club WA's Next Generation
Program with Mid West extension

**ECWA's Next Generation Program** helps to introduce the 'next generation' to the energy industry in a fun, interactive and educational environment.

We are an annual sponsor of the program (\$10,000), and in 2023 MEPAU collaborated with ECWA to introduce a Mid West extension to program, which will see increased engagement with high schools in the region and the introduction of a Mid West student expo in 2024 in addition to the Perth student expo.

In 2022, 1,300 students from 23 schools participated in the Next Generation program, including nine regional schools, and it is anticipated the 2023 numbers will exceed this.



# Preparing for a telecommunications outage in a natural disaster



# Mobile, landline and internet services keep Australians connected. But they may not be available in a natural disaster.

If a disaster impacts a communications network, emergency personnel, telecommunications carriers and energy providers will work together to get these services back up as quickly as they can. But this takes time, and they might have to wait until conditions are safe.

That's why it's important that you have backup options.

# How do I prepare for an outage during a natural disaster?

There are some easy things you can do to prepare for unexpected outages in an emergency or natural disaster:

- Don't rely on any single form of communication to see you through, as it could become unavailable.
- Include a portable battery powered radio with a spare set of batteries in your emergency kit so you can stay connected and up to date with emergency information.
- Keep your mobile charged and have a backup power source, like a battery pack.
- Pack some cash in your emergency kit, as EFTPOS or ATMs may not be working.

- Consider getting a satellite phone, UHF radio or personal location beacon as an alternative form of communications.
- Prepare and communicate your emergency plans to loved ones before you have to act on them.
- Write down contact numbers and email addresses for family and friends so you have them even if you can't recharge your phone.
- Follow advice from emergency personnel on the ground and Emergency Alert phone messages if received.
- While you can, monitor radio and television stations, emergency services websites, and social media for up-to-date warnings and information.
- If you're concerned for your safety, don't wait to be told to evacuate – prepare and leave early if it is safe to do so.



# From the Shire Archive

Well the final article from the Shire Archives for the year and the work still continues with lots of filing continuing. There always seems to be something to do within records and this week it has been taking some of the files from upstairs and putting them into the archive boxes. It can be a slow process as the files are removed from one system and added to another but the process works well and will make things easy to find into the future.

Last week we looked at Sewerage and Drainage and how we manage those records. This week we look at Traffic and Transport which can get confused sometimes with Roads. Road files seem to be more with the maintenance of the surface of roads and Traffic and Transport has to deal with what is using the road and how it is used. Records in this area include RAV ratings, signs, traffic management plans, airports, train lines, traffic counts etc. Traffic management does not deal so much with infrastructure therefore the disposal of the records are not as long. Saying that there are still some areas which need to be kept for a reasonable time. Traffic and Transport records are important as they give information as to how traffic in the Shire is maintained.




# **Covid Update**

We are seeing some cases of Covid re-emerge in the community. Unfortunately free Covid Tests are no longer available at the Shire as we have depleted stock. Please be aware that old Covid Tests have been known to dry up and therefore may not be an effective way of testing.

Masks may be required in a few different setting especially at medical facilities so please consider wearing them. The Shire of Carnamah does have some hand sanitiser still available if you require. This is free to the community.

Are you aged 75 years or older? If it has been 6 months since your last COVID-19 vaccination or infection, it is recommended that you receive an additional COVID-19 vaccine dose now.

People aged 65-74 years and people aged 18-64 with severe immunocompromise should also consider receiving an additional dose, following discussions with their health care provider.

If you are unsure of whether you have had a COVID-19 infection in the last 6 months, it is safe to get another dose.
